In Churches

- Use in connection with the work aimed at promoting healthy cultures (Section 1 of the Responding Well guidance)
- Share with anyone who is part of the public face of the church, including youth workers
- Use at parish safeguarding events, showing how everyone could respond to victims and survivors

In Dioceses

- Use to develop Survivor Reference Groups
- Use postcards during core group meetings to focus attention on the victim/survivor
- Create a diocesan resource bank so that parishes can borrow physical copies of the materials (e.g. DVD of the films)

In the Community

- Share with safeguarding boards and other partners through DSAP
- Share with statutory agencies
- Share with prison and hospital chaplains
- Share with local victim/survivor support
- Share with other organisations that offer peer support, e.g. Alcoholics Anonymous

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In Digital Media

- Diocesan websites
- Parish websites
- Diocesan social media
- Diocesan office reception screens
- Install screens in churches to play the videos

Reasons to use these materials

- They move victim impact up the agenda.
- The angels and music offer a different approach to the message through art and provide a power presentation of the message.
- They will help everyone in the church learn to listen and to have the confidence to listen well.
- They will support and promote the healing of congregations.
- They present a message that is part of the church's mission and ministry (not just safeguarding).
- They provide a means to bridge the 'them' and 'us' gap and will help people connect with each other in a meaningful way.
- They will get people talking.
- They are based on lived experience.
